FROM Rev. Suzanne:

For the last couple weeks, my Facebook feed has been full of pictures of people celebrating getting their first COVID vaccine shot, and an equal number of people frustrated and angry because they have not yet been able to get an appointment. This is an odd season when we seem to be living in the midst of both Good Friday and Easter simultaneously.

If you are one of those people who were able to receive your first shot, Alleluia! (Yes, I know it's Lent, but some things require a joyous expression of glory to God!) If you are still struggling to get an appointment, take heart in the words of **Psalm 30**:

- 2 O LORD my God, I cried out to you, * and you restored me to health.
- 3 You brought me up, O LORD, from the dead; * you restored my life as I was going down to the grave.
- 4 Sing to the LORD, you servants of his; * give thanks for the remembrance of his holiness.
- 5 For his wrath endures but the twinkling of an eye, * his favor for a lifetime.
- 6 Weeping may spend the night, * but joy comes in the morning

Most of the problems getting an appointment for the vaccine are because there are many more people who want the shot than there are vaccines in any given week. For example, last week Massachusetts vaccinated more than 215,000 people, some first shots, some second shots. More than 1.5 million doses have now been administered in total in the state. That's a lot of people! There were more than 2 million people who were eligible for those shots, so not everyone who wanted one was able to get one. The State knew this would be the case: in his announcement opening up vaccine eligibility to those over 65 on Feb. 17, Gov. Baker warned it would take a month for everyone who wanted an appointment to get one. But with each week that goes by, the number of people who have gotten shots goes up and the number of people who are still waiting goes down, and it will get easier to get an appointment.

The other piece of good news is that the number of places to get a shot is increasing, too. Half of the vaccines are being given at one of the State's "mass vaccination sites" in Danvers, Natick, Springfield, Foxboro, Boston, and Dartmouth, but there are also sites in collaboration with local hospitals in Worchester, Gardner, and Marlborough, as well CVS and Walgreens pharmacies in Hudson, Maynard, and Holden. Right now, there are more people looking for appointments at these sites than there are appointments available, but that will change. Keep checking regularly the state's centralized site, vaxfinder.mass.gov, as well as individual sites for locations near you: for mass vaccination sites, Thursday is the day the largest number of appointments are released. And keep the faith: as Christians, we are well accustomed to having to wait for the fulfillment of God's promises, and we can use that same patience as we journey toward the promised land of vaccination.

In the meantime, please remain vigilant about wearing your masks and keeping your distance. We can see the finish line, but we must still run the last mile! Continue to love your neighbor by

taking precautions against the spread of the virus: whatever you were doing in January, plan to keep doing it until June! Now might be a good time to look ahead to summer and anticipate some of the small pleasures that an easing of the pandemic will bring – worship together in the garden at Trinity, backyard barbecues with your family, walks in the woods with old friends, visits with grandchildren. This year, we can sing my favorite Easter hymn with more confidence:

Now the green blade riseth, from the buried grain,

Wheat that in dark earth many days has lain;

Love lives again, that with the dead has been:

Love is come again like wheat that springeth green.

Hold fast to hope: the end of the pandemic is coming, like wheat that springeth green.

From Stephanie Hooper, Junior Warden

Rectory Restoration Committee Minutes—February 26

We noted that Mitchell Tine, an electrician recommended by Karla Leonard, would be meeting with Chet and Stephanie later that day to check the electrical system in the rectory and to see what outlets needed updating. Anyone else on the rectory committee was invited to be at the meeting, as well.

We are still waiting for estimates from two stone masons about the cost of restoring the walkway and steps along the front of the rectory. Meredith also is waiting to hear back from another stone mason she had contacted several times.

Fred Shoemaker, for \$ 600.00, will install a gutter over the porch once the snow has melted. There was concern about what system Fred would use to divert the rainwater away from the area to the left of the porch where the rain is now flooding the ground. There were several suggestions that installing a dry well someday might relieve the flooding. Another idea to control the flooding was to put a rain barrel next to the barn to catch the water from the roof. Someone also recommended piping the run- off rainwater underground to the area beyond the barn.

Mass Save has been contacted about an energy audit for the rectory. Jean Reed reported that a team for working on the Restoration Capital Campaign Fund is being formed.

Meredith updated us on the projects that Bret is working on at the rectory and at Trinity Chapel.

Bret will make a new little wooden cross to go over the small roof outside the main entry to the Chapel, as the old cross is broken.

Bret has purchased window locks for the rectory windows, which he will be installing. Bret is planning to paint the floor in the room with the wood burning stove, this weekend.

Brett is working on repairing the sagging roof over the kitchen porch.

Bret also commented to Meredith that the driveway at the rectory is very muddy. He has contacted Powell Stone and Gravel to see what it would cost to order $\frac{3}{4}$ inch stones which could be packed down into the driveway to reduce the mud. Meredith has a friend who might be able to spread the stones in the driveway. Meredith also observed that at the same time, small stones might be used to create a small path from the parking lot up to the pathway leading to the Chapel side entrance.

We agreed that our next meeting should be on March 12th at 10.30 a.m.
