Then the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which will be to all people. For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2:10-11)

In the Congregational church I grew up in, Advent marked the start of the Christmas season. We hung the greens on the first Sunday of Advent, and sang Christmas carols until Christmas Day. So it was a shock to me when I arrived in the Episcopal church, and found Advent marked with the purple colors of Lent, somber music, and an emphasis on

penitence! It was not a change I embraced wholeheartedly.

Advent, though, is much more than just a "little Lent." As I've learned more about Catholic and Anglican tradition, I've discovered that this is a season with many characteristics. The somber, penitential mood I first noted is just one aspect of Advent. The practice of keeping a fast during Advent originated in France, Spain, and Germany, where it was intended as a spiritual preparation for keeping one of the church's primary Feasts, the Feast of the Nativity. In Rome, however, the season before Christmas was a festive time. There was no established fast, and the season was considered a joyful one. Eventually, the church harmonized its liturgies and its seasonal celebrations, and the result was a season that combined features of both traditions – a penitential character in a season that also looks forward with joy.

Still, it does sound rather contradictory, doesn't it? How can one be penitent and joyful at the same time? It wasn't until the Advent when I was nine months pregnant with my daughter, who was born on Dec. 26, that I really began to grasp the spirit of the season.

Late pregnancy is a time of a many strong emotions. There is joyful anticipation as you eagerly wait to for the new life you are carrying to enter the world. There's anxiety and even a little fear as you contemplate the difficulty and pain of labor. There's a certain amount of surrender, as late pregnancy's demands on your body means you are no longer fully in control of it. And finally, there is preparation for an event that will turn your life upside down in ways you know you cannot fully imagine.

I think this is a good way to think of Advent. We are joyfully anticipating the coming of the Light into the world, and the return of Christ in glory. There may be some anxiety, because we know from the Gospels that the passage from our current age into the Kingdom of God will not be without pain. We surrender to God, recognizing that we cannot fully control what happens in our lives or in the world, and trusting that God will see us through this passage. And we prepare our hearts for an event that will surely turn our lives upside down in ways we cannot fully imagine.

Penitence in Advent is all about preparing our hearts for Christ's coming, much the way we prepare the nursery for a new baby. Pausing to remember and confess our sins allows us to move them out of our hearts, to leave them at the foot of the cross, so that we have space to receive the forgiveness and love God offered to us through a child in a manger. And that is surely a cause for celebration!

If you would like your donation to be in memory of or in honor of someone, please write a note that effect and put it in an envelope with your check.



RECTORY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES, FRIDAY





PRESENT: Karla Leonard; Lyn Doran; Stephanie Hooper; Chet Hooper; Jean Read; Meredith Marcinkewicz; Nan Gulliver; Nancy Shepherd; Sharron Pothier; and the Rev. Suzanne Wade.

WORK AT THE RECTORY:

Stephanie reported that Bret has sent a link to the photo he took of the Chapel at Night which she will have printed and then give to Robert Adam and Mark Davidson as a thank you for the amazing restoration work they did on the back of the rectory.

Chet has gone around the outside of the rectory with the painter, Bill Lombardi, and has noted what needs to be fixed before Bill can paint the rectory.Bill commented that some window sills need to be repaired and a few loose boards replaced. Bret has agreed to repair the window sills this winter.

Bret will smooth over the area in the parking lot where the dumpster used to be with the extra stones piled there. We will get an estimate from Guthrie Brothers about the cost of putting stones along the bottom of the wall in the restored section of the back of the rectory and also the cost of leveling this area so the water can drain away from the house.

Bret has commented that his wife has heard something chewing behind the wall of the upstairs bedroom. Stephanie will ask Montachusetts Pest Control to come back to bait both the rectory and the chapel. (Note—Montachusetts Pest Control will meet Stephanie and Chet at the Chapel November 24th).

Chet will check with Mr. Quinty at Shirley Fuel and Gas to see if the furnaces need to be cleaned in both the rectory and the Chapel. He also will check to see whether there is a filter on the furnace in the Chapel as people have been complaining about dampness in the building, especially in the vestibule outside Shepherd Hall. We also may need to consult a professional to look at the dampness problem.

Bret will insulate the kitchen pipes in the rectory.

The Adopt a Window Campaign is going well. Through the Adopt a Window Campaign we have already raised over a third of the total cost of restoring the thirty- five windows in the Chapel building. Fred has already begun work on these windows but does not want to be paid until he has finished painting and restoring all the windows. Money continues to come in to help cover the cost of \$100 a window, and Stephanie and Chet have agreed to pay the difference of any money that is needed at the end of the job.

RESTORATION FUND:

We are looking for a new Chair for the Capital Campaign and will discuss this need at the next vestry meeting.

STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN.

Chet, Jim Spall, Donna King, Lyn Doran and Suzanne are on the Finance Committee, and Suzanne agreed to set up a date for a meeting soon to discuss the Stewardship Campaign. She offered to send around an email giving different possibilities for a time for the Committee to meet

Rectory Committee minutes continued

DISCUSSION WITH THE REV. SUZANNE WADE ABOUT FUTURE USES FOR THE RECTORY ONCE IT IS MADE SAFE AND SECURE.

1) The Vestry will have to talk about the future possible use of the rectory once it is safe and secure. There was a discussion about whether Suzanne could have her office there even if she is not living there but Suzanne said she did not need an office there. Her office at home is quiet.

2) If we were to rent the rectory, we would probably have to pay taxes, although the rental fees might offset that.

3) Another problem with renting the rectory is that it could be difficult to find someone to repair and fix a sudden problem.

4) We have a lead paint problem as the rectory is old. It would be illegal for anyone under five to live there because lead paint has been used.

5) It was noted that it would probably be a year before we have to decide what to do with the rectory.

6) We talked about discussing further the use of the rectory at the Annual Meeting in January.
